ASSIGNMENT 2

A Spiritual Assessment of Your Territory

Monte Coca and the Dominican Republic

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Scriptural frame. During Bethel School of the Prophets in August 2026, Jeremiah 1:4–6 came to me spontaneously. The passage illuminates this assignment: God knows, consecrates, and sends before the servant feels sufficient. Jeremiah 1:10 extends that call into territorial responsibility—to uproot, build, and plant according to God’s purposes.

This assessment reflects an earlier season of approximately a decade of integrated medical and spiritual missions. Monte Coca was the clearest geographic center, with service extending into communities throughout the Dominican Republic through clinics, health and spiritual teaching, preaching, practical gifts, prayer, and discipleship.

1. Defined Territory

My historical mission territory was Monte Coca and surrounding communities within the wider Dominican Republic field. It included individuals, families, local believers, emerging disciples, community leaders, and people reached through medical and spiritual ministry. Latin America therefore represents an established prior international sphere in my history, with the Dominican Republic as its clearest expression.

2. Spiritual Assessment

Across repeated visits, I encountered a territory receptive to compassionate presence, biblical truth, healing ministry, practical service, and sustained relationship. The recurring needs included strengthened hope, affirmed identity and dignity, nourished faith, addressed physical suffering, and discipleship extending beyond a single encounter. The response was constructive and pastoral: serve the whole person, listen to God and the community, and join medical care with teaching, preaching, generosity, prayer, and discipleship.

3. Physical Research and Longitudinal Observation

My understanding developed through approximately a decade of direct participation. Repeated missions supported observation and continuity across time. Clinics addressed health needs; teaching shared knowledge; preaching and prayer opened space for spiritual response; gifts met practical needs; and discipleship supported growth. The area in and around Monte Coca has since been remarkably transformed, as have the lives of its people.

4. Kingdom Goal and Strategy

The goal during that season was to participate faithfully in transformation among people and place by strengthening health, hope, faith, dignity, discipleship, and local capacity. The strategy followed an integrated pattern:

- **Listen:** Seek God’s direction and attend carefully to community realities.
- **Serve:** Provide compassionate medical care and practical assistance.
- **Teach:** Share health knowledge, biblical truth, and transferable wisdom.
- **Preach and pray:** Proclaim the gospel and minister with faith, humility, and love.
- **Give:** Offer tangible resources with generosity and shared dignity.
- **Disciple:** Cultivate formation that can deepen, multiply, and remain.

5. Results and Present Meaning

The direct mission season has concluded. Its fruit remains visible in people and place: the area in and around Monte Coca has undergone remarkable transformation, and lives have changed through the cumulative ministry of care, teaching, preaching, prayer, giving, relationship, and discipleship. This history now informs my prophetic formation by showing how integrated service, sustained relationship, and the strengthening of local people can become enduring seeds of transformation.

Lord, continue to establish Your purposes in Monte Coca and throughout the Dominican Republic. Let every seed of health, faith, dignity, wisdom, leadership, and discipleship continue to bear fruit through the people and communities of this territory.
